Value of the month - our value of the month is patience.

Dear parents and guardians,

What a wet and windy start to this term. Please do ensure that your child has the correct coat and footwear for their day. We do not take children outside when the weather is poor, however a light drizzle or a chill in the air will not stop us with our outdoor learning. We would also add that all clothing does need to be labelled in some way or form, so that we can return it to the correct child.



Attendance – everyday counts! Our current whole school attendance is 93%! Good attendance is vital for all children, and we work to ensure all classes achieve that. The knowledge and skills that your child gains will support their achievements over time.

Persistent cases where poor attendance and punctuality do not improve can be considered neglect. Government departments track school attendance figures. It is considered that attendance of 90% or below is persistent absence which will be closely monitored by school staff. Failing to improve on this 90% can lead to prosecution, which school want to help families avoid.

The table below provides an example of the impact of lost learning through pupil absence:

So a child who has an attendance of 80% has missed 38 days of school and has missed 190 lessons.

Love of reading – in school, we have been focusing on developing every child in school to be a lover of reading and how being read to or reading for pleasure is so good for mental health & well-being but also allows for a greater access to learning. Moreover, our artists will be making secondary and tertiary colours in art as well as refining their painting skills! Computing this term is all about programming and algorithms; meanwhile, our scientists are investigating the properties of everyday materials. So while the weather may be challenging this January, we'll be too busy thinking about space to mind!
